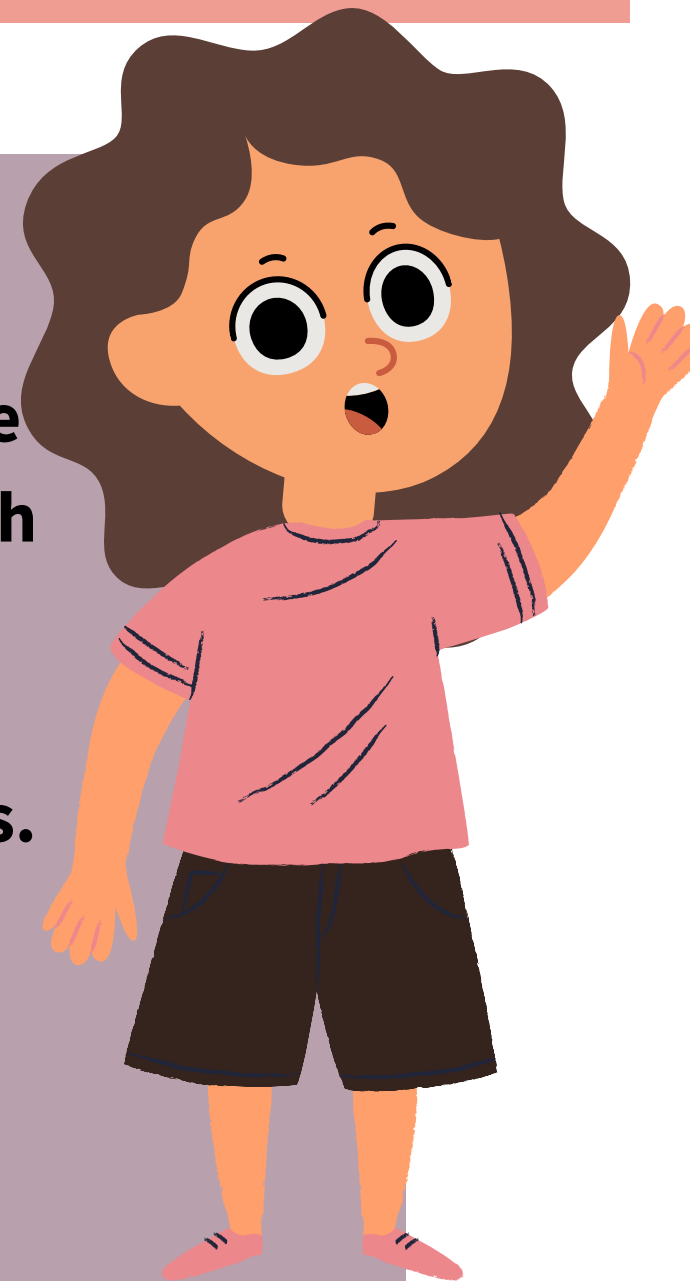

HOW DO YOU IMAGINE A WORLD WHERE CHILDREN LEARN ABOUT THEIR RIGHTS?



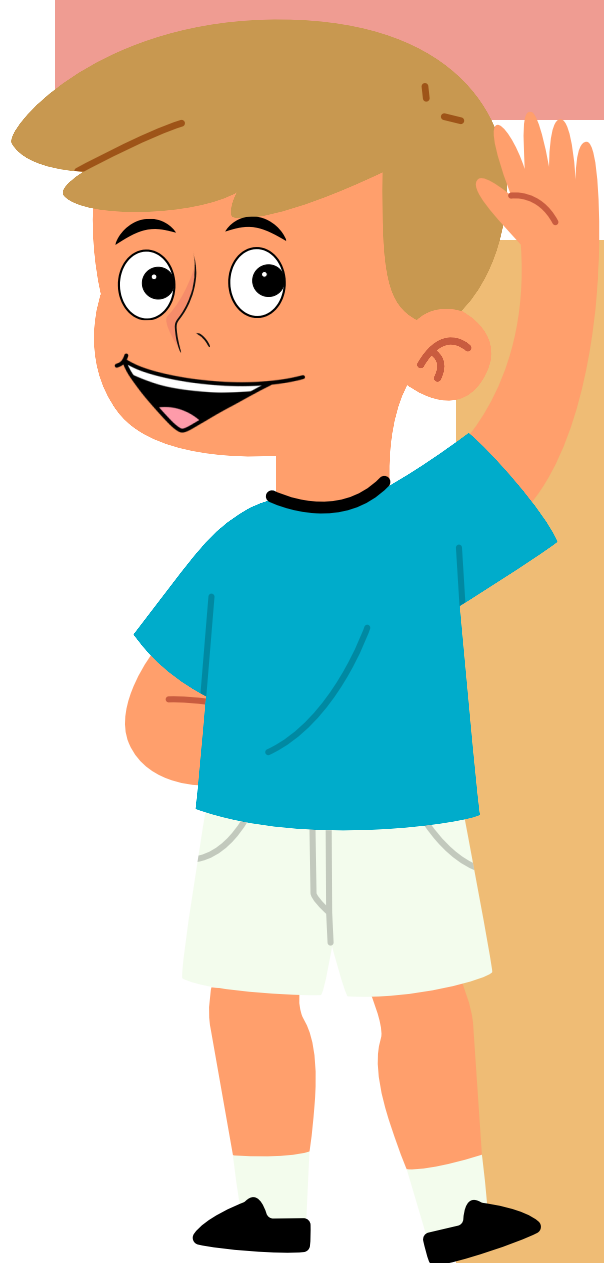
