This world is not designed for children to have to adapt to an adult space; on the contrary, it is where we can all walk hand in hand and grow together.

I see that there are no cases of violence against children and adolescents, disappearances or recruitment, there is no adult-centrism and the principle of priority is a reality. With it, many safe, comfortable and friendly spaces for all children and adolescents, to worthily promote the leading participation of children and adolescents accompanied by the full exercise of the right to access information, achieving recognition of the power of thought and action that we have, allowing us to have greater influence within public policies.

It would be a world in which the term "child citizenship" is recognized by law, so that we are legally citizens, ensuring that everyone sees us as the agents of change that we are, understanding that change lies within us and that investing in children and adolescents will never be a waste of time. This is how I imagine a world where we are safe, one that seems to be getting closer and closer, and that requires collective work to become a reality.
