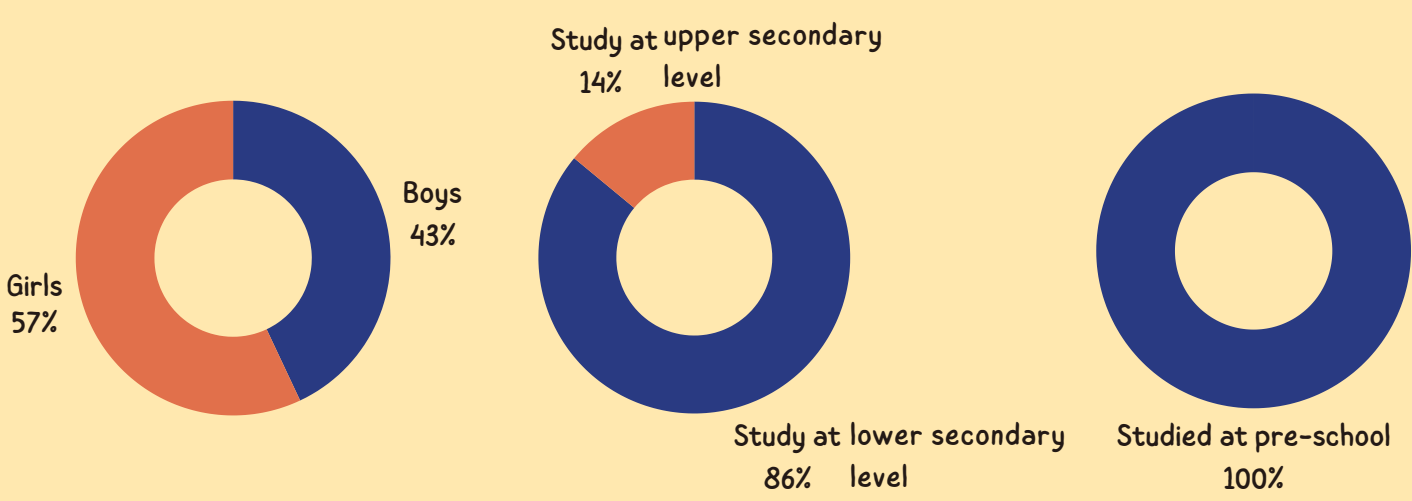




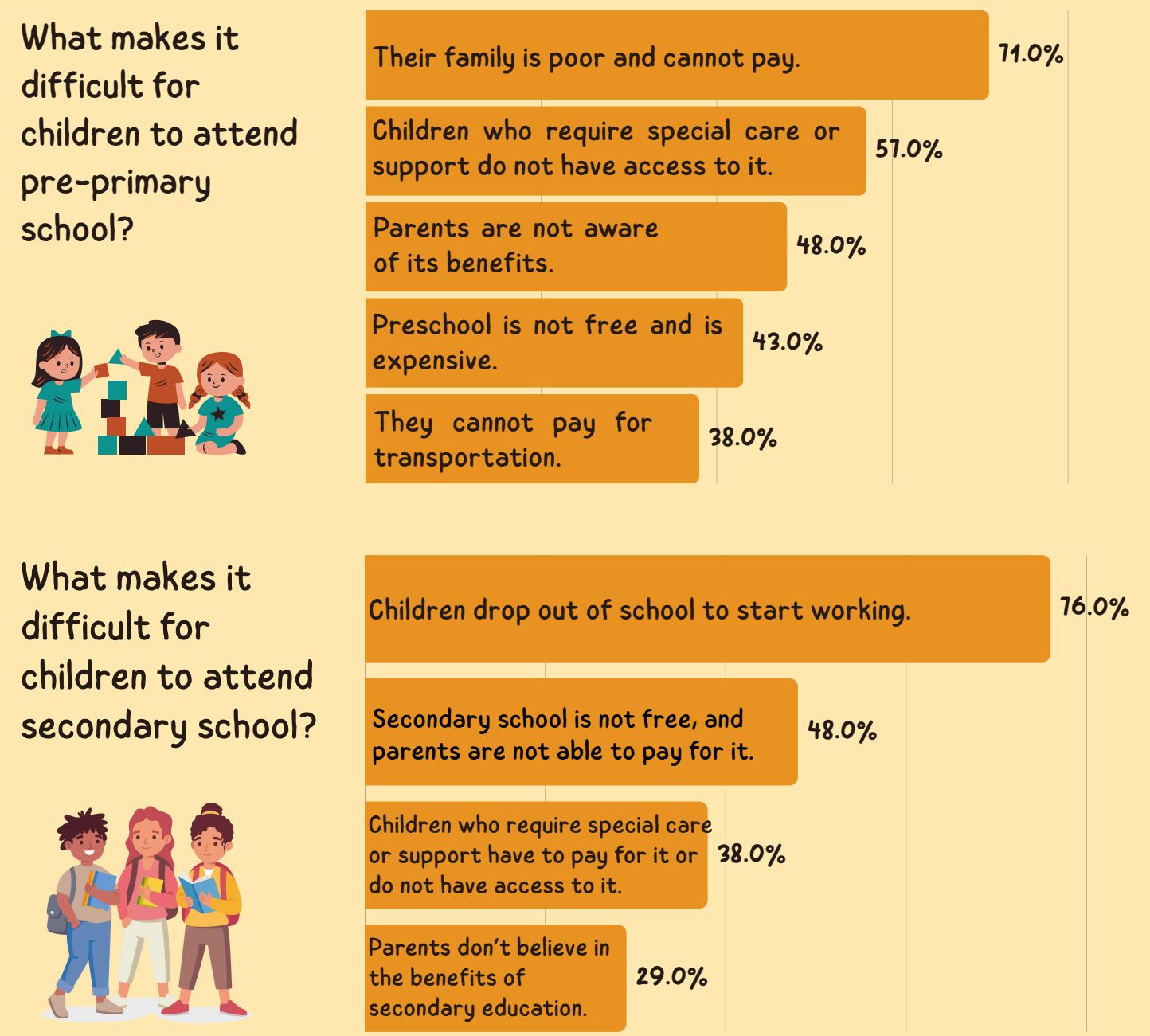
What children in Palestine said about access to free public pre-primary and secondary education?

What we know about the children who filled out the survey?

21 children replied to the survey. Most of them were 14, 15 and 16 years old.



What did they say in their replies?



If children can go to free public preschool,

they develop their social and communication skills.

81%

their brain develop better.

62%

they will not be sent to work to support their families at a young age.

62%

they can break the cycle of poverty by continuing their education.

57%

If children can go to free public secondary school,

they have the chance to continue their studies at university.

71%

they are less likely to get married off as a child or exposed to violence.

62%

they will be more prepared for adult life, and they will be able to create a better life for themselves and for their own children.

62%

they have more chance to find a decent job and earn their living.

52%

In Palestine, schooling is compulsory for children between the age 6 of and 15, while 2 years of preschool and 12 years of primary and secondary education is free.

Do some children have a harder time or greater challenges attending public pre-primary and secondary school than other children?

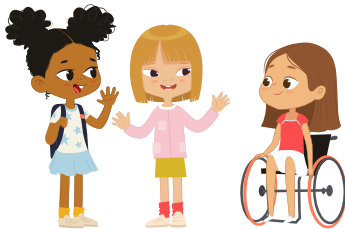

What should governments do to make sure that all children can attend public pre-primary and public secondary education for free?

- ☒ To provide high quality free education in all regions and areas by building public schools and making online education available (67%)
- ☒ To provide free school meals, textbooks, uniforms (61%)
- ☒ To give scholarships (62%)
- ☒ To encourage parents to send their children to school, particularly families from vulnerable communities (57%)
- ☒ To provide free school meals, textbooks, uniforms (57%)
- ☒ To adapt the school environment to be inclusive and offer integrated or alternative learning methods for those who need it (52%)
- ☒ Prevent school dropouts using an early warning system (43%)
- ☒ To protect the schools and the children therein (43%)
